

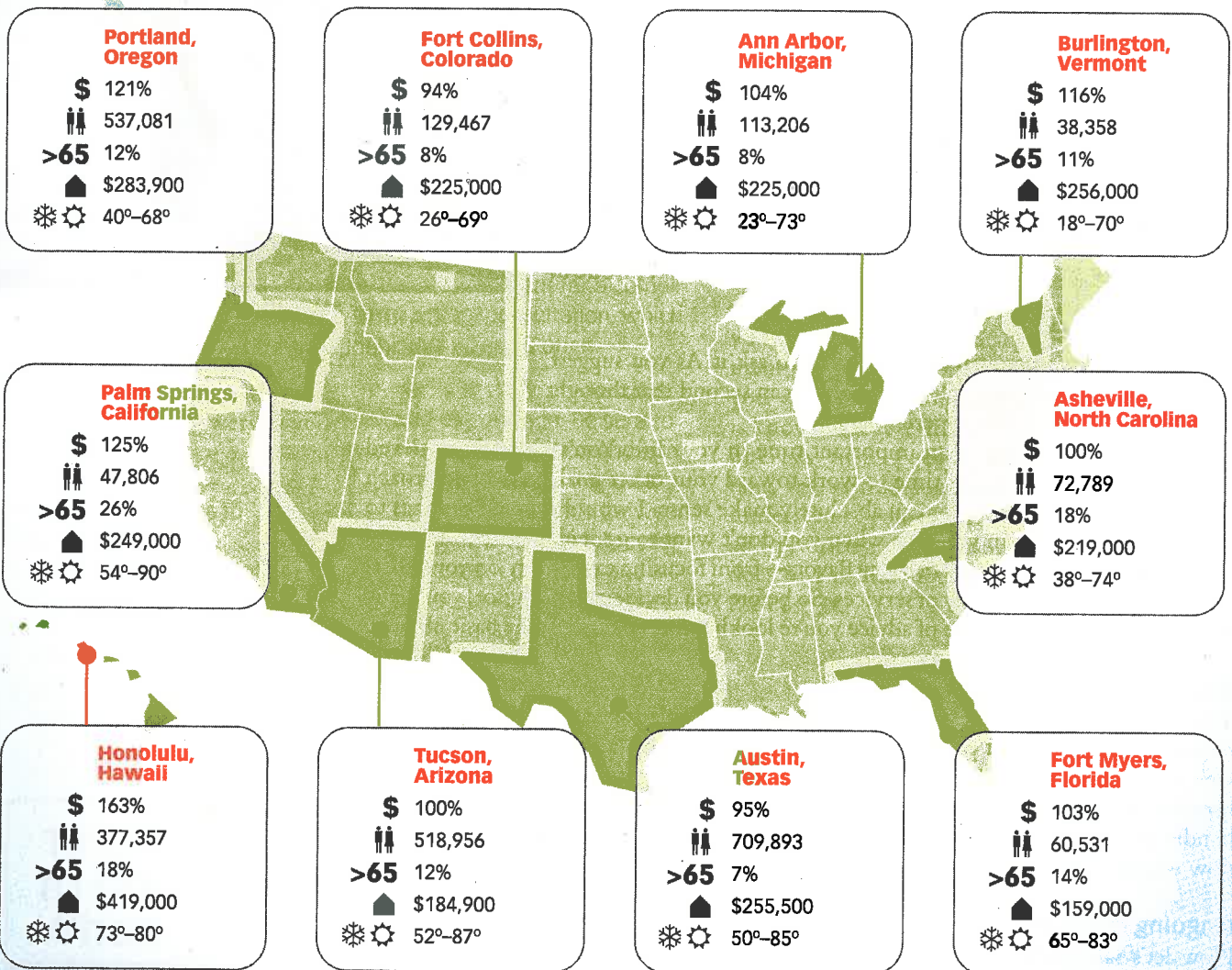
Where Do You See Yourself?

The table below provides a snapshot of 10 cities considered to be some of the best places to retire in the United States.¹
